Other responses range from "Santa" to "You get to rip paper off boxes."

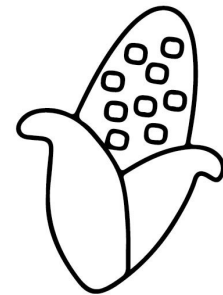
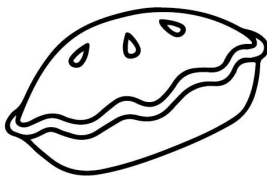
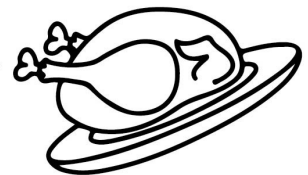
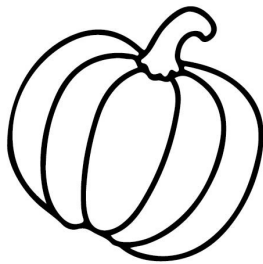
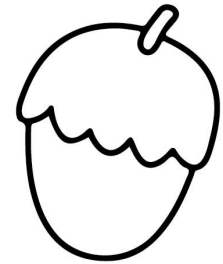
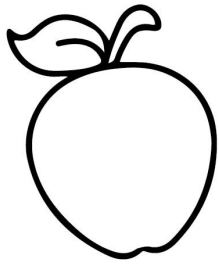


One student simply proclaims "COOKIE."
